Project-Based Learning



The children have enjoyed a fabulous final term of our first year of Project-Based Learning at Cavendish. They have participated in a wide range of creative, engaging projects linked to the wider curriculum skills and produced a varied range of high-quality outcomes.



In Year 3, the children worked together to produce and perform a short play all about WW2 evacuation, linked to their current 'In the Blitz' topic. The children particularly focused on exploring the emotions of the various characters in the play and were able to demonstrate this in their performance through their body language, facial expressions and tone of voice. The play was enjoyed by all of the children and staff in Year 3!

In Year 4, the children have recently enjoyed a project all about Italian food, linked to their 'Romans' topic. The children used their research skills to explore and find out all about traditional dishes in Italy and which area of the country they originated from. They then wrote their shopping lists, walked to the local supermarket 'Morrisons' to purchase all the ingredients and came back to school to make delicious pizza pitta breads for everyone to enjoy!

Year 5 have just completed a very exciting project led by a much loved visitor to our school, Sadhana Patel. The project focused on British values and preparing the children for the transition to Year 6 in September. The children thoroughly enjoyed the project and working with Sadhana to ensure they are fully ready to begin their final year at Cavendish.

Year 6 have used their design and technology skills to create a creature who can act as a 'classroom guardian' during the summer holidays! The children needed to consider several important factors when designing their figure, making sure that it was: large enough to create an immediate impression, stable so that it didn't fall over, stiff so that it kept its shape, strong to prevent it breaking easily and durable to ensure it would be long lasting. The children produced some fantastic figures that were impressive in both their quality of construction and finish!

Under the Sea YEARI

This half term, the topic in Year 1 has been 'Under the Sea' and what a great time we have had finding out and learning lots of new facts. First, we started by researching the oceans and their habitats. There are 5 oceans in the world. The ocean that surrounds our country is called the Atlantic Ocean. We then looked at the different sea animals which live in our oceans. Did you know a Megalodon is one of the largest species of shark? We have looked closely at the Great Barrier Reef and the Arctic Ocean and compared how they are different.

We then read the book 'Commotion in the Ocean' by Giles Andreae where we focused on rhyming words and wrote our own rhyming poems about sea animals. After this, we explored concrete poems and wrote our own poems in the shape of whales, octopuses and waves. We have spent a lot of time making sea animals, such as jellyfish in the provision, and have painted ocean and beach scenes at the painting easel. We have had such fun this half term!

LifeSavers

From September, we will become 1 of only 62 schools in the UK to offer Financial Education to children from Reception to Year 6 via the 'Lifesavers' scheme.

A major part of this work is the launch of the savings club, through which we are able to offer every child in school the opportunity to save money in their own savings account.

Parents/Carers will need to register free online to set up their child's account. Children can then bring their money into school each week or as often as they like, to add to their own savings account.

Further information on how to register will be sent out in the new school year but we would encourage every child to sign up to this scheme and begin their journey as life savers!

This term the school council have been helping to produce a reading survey for KS2 children to complete.

The information gained from this survey will be really valuable in completing our whole school reading audit and next steps for reading next year.




Letters from Gambia ___

Apparently the children were thrilled and very grateful to receive our gifts and here is one of the thank you letters we received from them this week:


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
