# Project-Based Learning



Throughout Key Stage Two, there have been lots of exciting projects being taught allowing the children to develop their wider curriculum skills. In all of the projects, the children have worked collaboratively and respectfully and have thoroughly enjoyed the wide range of different learning opportunities. Here is a snapshot of our learning this term.









Year 3 had a fantastic morning at Bradford Cathedral. Whilst they were there they took part in a treasure hunt and found out about the fascinating features of the Cathedral such as the font, the lectern and the pulpit. The children thoroughly enjoyed the visit and produced some brilliant work linked to the Centenary of the Cathedral back at school.

"When I walked in to the Cathedral I was amazed by the patterns on the walls. My favourite feature was the font because it had an old fashioned lid covered in patterns," BROOKLYN DUNN Year 4 have been learning all about Fairtrade. They have learnt how Fairtrade improves the working conditions and lives of the farmers and workers in developing countries. The children used Fairtrade ingredients to bake their own chocolate chip cookies. Delicious!

"I really enjoyed learning about how Fairtrade products allowed farmers to get a fair wage. We used Fairtrade chocolate chips to make cookies, they were delicious!"

LACEY-MAI ASTWOOD 4F Year 5 have been designing and making their own Greek pottery. They sculpted a piece of clay into the shape of a Greek crater vase. Geometric shapes and patterns were then used to decorate their vase. Some children decided to paint the patterns onto their vase, others decided to paint the whole vase and then scrape away the paint to reveal their pattern.

### Safer Internet Week



Tuesday 5 February was Safer Internet Day so we decided to spend time over the whole week to <u>focus on keeping safe online.</u>

Safer Internet Week gave us the opportunity to highlight positive uses of technology and to explore the role we all play in helping to create better and safer online communities. We used class discussions and key stage assemblies to discuss internet safety. We used short films and images to promote discussion.

We explored a range of issues including being careful about the information we give to people online, making sure that we know the people we communicate with online and cyber bullying. We wrote poems and made posters and leaflets.

Online safety remains an important part of our learning at Cavendish. Many classes in school will be having, or will already have had, lessons with the PCSO to help develop our understanding of how to keep ourselves and others safe online.



This half term the Nursery children have been learning all about growing and life cycles. We have been reading the stories 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar' and 'Jack and the Beanstalk'. We all grew some cress seeds and monitored their growth, they are really tall now! We also have some real caterpillars in our classroom, the children have enjoyed observing them grow and have been very gentle when looking at them. 

We wanted to experience what Policing was like in Victorian times and how Policing has changed throughout the years.
