Our competitions started in the second week of September, this time getting underway with the Year 6 Hockey. Having had very little opportunity to practice, the team performed extremely well, winning four of their first five matches and making it through to the second round. During this, all the players showed excellent tactical awareness and determination. The second round took place a number of weeks later, and this time the matches were much more difficult, resulting in us winning one, drawing one and losing three. Well done to all the children who were part of the hockey team for showing great sportsmanship whilst representing the school and for finishing fifth overall.

Next it was the turn of the U11 girls football team. I had eighteen girls attend the after school club, which made selecting the team very difficult as they were all very keen. Some of the Year 6 girls were part of the team last year, but we also welcomed three girls from Year 5 into the team and they showed great skill and determination during all of the matches they played. Even though some other teams were much more experienced, our girls performed to the best of their ability and I was really proud of them for topping their group. They then progressed through to the finals against all the other group winners.

Three wins, one draw and one loss meant that they finished in third place overall, only missing out on reaching the Bradford Winter Games Finals by one goal on goal difference. It was lovely to see the girls grow together as a team and become much more confident footballers.

Eight children from Year 6 attended the LAP Frisbee festival at Woodhouse Grove. They showcased the skills that they had learnt during their PE lessons in the first part of the autumn term and put in some great performances. They showed great encouragement to each other and sportsmanship towards the other teams during the competition. It was lovely to see their performances improve with each game and out of the ten teams who took part they did really well to finish second in their group and third overall.

The U9 football team once again entered their league, which was hosted at Bradford Grammar School as part of the Bradford Autumn Games. This was the first time any of these boys had played together in a team and they were understandably nervous to begin with. They were unlucky to lose their first game but as their nerves settled their results improved. They drew their next game and finished by winning their final two games. We witnessed some moments of individual brilliance

along with good teamwork, resilience and perseverance. The boys should be really proud of themselves for finishing in second place in their group.

In the second half of the Autumn term, children in Year 4 have been working really hard in their PE lessons to improve their golf skills. They have also attended an after school club each Tuesday evening and during the last week of term they took part in the LAP Golf festival. This was a great opportunity for them to showcase their skills and everyone performed to the best of their ability. They won each of the six events, therefore finishing the competition in first place. They were fantastic representatives of the school in their performance, behaviour and sportsmanship.

Also this half term, Year 6 have been working on basketball in their PE lessons, to help them prepare for their basketball competition. They will be taking part in their competition as this magazine goes to print but once again, having witnessed some of the individual skills on show, I am sure that they will be excellent representatives and make the school proud.

Finally, I would like to thank all the staff who have helped with sport in school, particularly Mrs Halliday and Miss Morkan who are my regular minibus drivers.


Year 3 Project Based Learning

Next, we went inside and the ladies put a pair of grinding stones on the table so that we could make flour out of the grains. After, we took turns to crush salt crystals. We used the salt, flour, water and also some yeast, which smelt disgusting, to create dough. Finally, one of the ladies came around making a ball out of the dough and then she cut a cross through it. In the end after baking they looked amazing and smelled delicious. We couldn't eat them though so I was kind of sad.



On 20 November, Year 4 carried out a science investigation to find out about different types of leaves!
