I really liked looking at how the Neclithic farmers used to hunt for their food and how they used to run the farms: DAVID, MULBERRY CLASS During the first Autumn half term, Year 3 were busy learning all about the Stone Age. They explored the three time periods of the era which include: The Palaeolithic Stone Age (Early Stone Age), Mesolithic (Middle Stone Age) and Neolithic (Later Stone Age). The children became archaeologists and had to investigate which artefact belonged to which time period. The children also researched what it would be like to be a farmer during the Neolithic era. Finally, Year 3 had a fantastic time during their projectbased learning lessons using the story of the 'Stone Age Boy' to explore a range of emotions and act out the plot in small groups. The children have thoroughly enjoyed learning about the Stone Age.
